CLASSROOM NEWS



KINDERGARTEN NEWS

Kindergarten is moving and grooving! We have settled into our routines and have moved on to Unit 3 in Reading and Writing. We will be identifying the topic and details of non-fiction texts. We will also be writing informational texts based on what we have read. We are applying all our hard work in phonics to read leveled books, decodable books, and then stretch out our words to spell in writing. In Math we are building upon the counting and comparing skills, in order to collect, sort, classify, and compare objects in categories. At the end of November, we will begin our unit on Addition. In Science we are learning all about plants and animals. At the end of November, we will be switching into some Social Studies to learn about the past vs the present.

FIRST GRADE NEWS

We had a great October! We learned all about fictional characters and the important lessons we can learn through stories. We are looking forward to starting our new unit that focuses on why it's important to be a good community member. We'll be learning about how we can get involved in our community and what it means to be a responsible member of our community. Our math unit this month will focus on continuing to grow our addition and subtraction skills, but we will begin building a deeper understanding of the problems we are solving. This includes adding three numbers, explaining whether equations are true or false, and learning about the Associative Property of Addition.

SECOND GRADE NEWS

As we continue on in 2nd Grade, we are still learning everyday and are excited about our units of study! In ELA, we just started Unit 3 where we are learning about Why Do We Need a Government! We have settled into our reading environments and we continue to work on building our reading stamina with just-right books! In Science, we are still exploring and learning about How Living Things Change and will soon begin learning about Matter and Its Properties! In Math, we are working on Subtracting with Numbers to 100! We hope everyone has a fantastic Thanksgiving Break from 11/20 - 11/24! Please always continue to monitor your child's backpack and stay in communication with your child's teacher through ClassDojo. We can't wait for even more excitement as we move further into 2nd Grade!

THIRD GRADE NEWS

Third grade is finished with the first trimester of school. Report cards will be available soon. Looking forward, we will be starting a unit on Government with practice of concepts in reading and writing regarding this topic. . Your child should read 15 minutes every day, or can be read to by you or another relative. Please keep an eye on teacher emails and Class Dojo account for further communication. In your math classes we learning about Geometry. Please try to enforce what is geometrical at home. Thank you for your cooperation.

FOURTH GRADE NEWS

Fourth graders have been working hard in all subjects. We have fully gotten into our routines and are learning a lot. We have learned how to write informative essays and are now working on writing our opinion We just finished our fiction unit about essavs. character actions and reactions and have begun our non-fiction unit where we will be learning about the different branches of Government. In math we have learned to multiply numbers by 2-digits and just started learning how to divide. We have also learned many things in science, including food chains and food webs and are beginning our unit on matter. Everyone had a good time at Literary-liscious and we are all looking forward to time with family and friends during the upcoming break.

FIFTH GRADE NEWS

Fifth grade is continuing to work hard and are doing a great job! We have just finished our Character Unit, and starting Unit 3. New Worlds Reading Inititative and Scholarships

Florida's New Worlds Reading Initiative (NWRI) is open for enrollment! New Worlds Reading is a free statewide program to advance literacy and a love of reading for Florida students in Grades VPK-5. The program is to help students read on grade level through a monthly at-home book and literacy resource delivery program.

Any child in Grads K – 5 not yet reading on grade level is eligible to enroll. Parents mus enroll their children. Here is the <u>Enrollment Link</u>. Once enrolled in the program, students remain in the program until they advance to Grade 6 or the parent opts out of the program.

Every registered student receives a free book each month during the school year and three books through the summer months. Select books are available in English, Spanish, Haitian Creole, and large print.


PTO News

FROM THE DESK OF YOUR HEALTH Care District School Nurse:


Set a regular bedtime for your child. Regular bedtimes are important and could have lifelong impacts on health.

Studies have confirmed the importance of setting a regular bedtime for school-aged children. Not only does sleep affect children's test scores, it was found that children who do not have regular bedtimes are more likely to have behavioral difficulties, such as hyperactivity, conduct problems, problems with peers and emotional difficulties. A recent study also reported that children who switched to a more regular bedtime showed clear improvements in their behavior.

The National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute recommends at least 10 hours of sleep per day for school-aged children. Setting a regular bedtime can be challenging; however, the benefits to your child are extremely valuable as early child development has profound influences on health and well-being throughout one's life.
