5 IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

1. When does it begin?

Most developmental disabilities begin before a baby is born, but some can happen after birth because of injury, infection, or other factors.

2. What causes it?

Most developmental disabilities are thought to be caused by a complex mix of factors including genetics, parental health and behaviors (such as smoking and drinking) during pregnancy, birth complications, infections, and exposure to high levels of environmental toxins, such as lead during pregnancy.

3. Over one billion

About 15% of the world's population live with a disability.

4. The numbers are increasing substantially

More and more people are living with disabilities due to demographic change including population aging and the global increase in chronic health conditions.

5. Inadequate healthcare

Half of the people with disability cannot afford healthcare, compared to a third of people without disabilities.

ACCESS TESTING

ACCESS Testing- Testing will be completed this month for our K-5 ELL students. Individual student reports will be sent home in the Fall.

Parent Conferences- It is important that you know how your child is doing academically. Teachers are scheduling second parent conferences. If you haven't had a conference, please contact your child's teacher.



Supporting learning in the language opposite of your home language: This can be extremely challenging if your child is the only bilingual family member. The truth is, language development takes hard work in the classroom, too! Students are engaged in language production with scaffolds and support provided by the teacher, and with plenty of talk time and opportunities to interact with others using those supports. Confidence is built through these supports, and thus language eventually flows. Things you can do at home to help your child Engage in language fun! Watch favorite movies in the target language, listen to audiobooks, or create family flashcards where everyone is practicing vocabulary and learning the target language. Find ways to infuse language learning in your home or daily routine so that language exposure is not just provided by the teacher. While these extra steps do take time, they are worth the effort to instill a positive attitude and mindset around language learning

Dual language parent engagement workshops intend to empower parents with a clear and interactive understanding of dual language education to thrive and be able to help their children thrive and reach their full bilingual, biliterate, and socio-cultural potential.



Kindergarten:

We are certainly marching on this semester! Three months into the New Year! Time surely flies when we are learning and having fun! Many exciting things are going on this month as well as many great learning opportunities. In reading, your Kindergartener is using many different strategies during the reading process! The students have been working very hard to decode text and comprehend what they are reading. They are also learning to re-read the text until it sounds nice and smooth. It is very important to support your child in reading at home and read to them daily or have them read to you. After reading, ask your child about the characters in their book. Discuss with them what the character did (their actions) throughout the book and how this made the character feel. Ask your child to use the pictures or specific parts of the text to support what they tell you about their characters. In math, students practice counting and recognizing numbers up to 100. Also, we are working on multiple strategies to add & subtract, problem-solve, and increase fact fluency within 20! We appreciate the extra help you are giving your child on basic math facts, in addition to adding and subtracting within 20.

First Grade:

First Grade Families...Can you believe it is March already!! It's great to see the amount of growth your child has made. Thank you for all the efforts you have put in at home to help your child here at school! Here are some helpful hints to support your child at home: read or listen to books (fiction and nonfiction), review telling time (o'clock and half past) and the value of coins (penny, nickel, dime, quarter), talk about the past/present/future, and discuss natural resources. A few reminders: check your child's folder every night, ask them how their day was, and encourage them to find a cozy spot and read for at least 20 minutes every day! Look on your child's portal and check their SIS cube...you will find their grades, progress reports, and report cards. Continue to go on Benchmark to increase reading skills and Reflex Math to increase fact fluency! Our focus this month is women in history. At home, discuss women in history...who they are and why they are important. Let's keep up the good work! Hope everyone has a safe and healthy spring break! We all deserve it!

Second Grade:

We can't wait to celebrate Dr. Seuss week the first week of March! Look at the school calendar or our blue folders to see what the dress up days are! This month in math we are learning all about adding and subtracting three digit numbers. We have learned many strategies that help us learn. This unit in reading is all about investigating the past and how understanding the past helps shape our future. In science, we have been learning about forces around us. Please remember spring break starts March 18th and field day is March 15th. Thank you for your constant support!!

Third Grade:

As we transition into the spring season, here are some important dates and celebrations to keep in mind: March is Women's History Month, a time to celebrate and honor the contributions and achievements of women throughout history. We will learn about some inspiring women who have made significant impacts in various fields and industries.

Keep an eye out for our Recognition Awards Assembly date where we will celebrate the achievements and efforts of our students throughout the second trimester. More details will be provided soon, so stay tuned!

Spring Break is approaching! Students will be off from March 18 to March 25. We hope everyone has a safe and enjoyable time off. It's an excellent opportunity for our students to rest, rejuvenate, and spend quality time with family and friends.
