Updates from Mrs. Patrick, Principal

Meadow Park Families,

The safety of our students is our number one priority. I need your help! Please remember that students should not be dropped off at school prior to 7:30 a.m. unless your child attends a morning tutoring session. Staff are not on duty until 7:30 a.m. and I am very concerned someone is going to get injured.

Morning drop off does go very smoothly when everyone is following the expectations.

- 1. Drive all the way up to the white line where Officer Diaz and Ms. White stand.
- 2. Once the line stops, your child can get out of the car ANYWHERE along the sidewalk in front of the school
- 3. Only parents who drop off for PreK, staff and visitors should use the left lane.
- 4. Visitor parking spots are reserved for parents that need to go to the office. Please refrain from using these spots if you are not going into the building.
- 5. If you come after the 8:00 bell, you must park and sign your child in.

If everyone follows the expectations, there should be no line at 8:00 to cause your child to be late!

Testing Updates

We are in the process of selecting specific grade level and content area dates for our Progress Monitoring 3 (PM3) State Assessments. First, our 4th and 5th grade students will take their Writing Assessment in early April. Students in Grades K-2 will assess Reading and Math during the month of April. Students in Grades 3-5 will assess Reading and Math during the month of May. In addition, 5th graders will take their State Science Assessment in May.

Updates from Mrs. Haag, SSCC

Students are currently finishing their literary units on Fables and Myths. They will soon be starting an informational unit which focuses on how the past influences the present. Please be sure to ask your child questions about how understanding and learning about the past helps us learn more about the future or even influences positive changes in the present and future.




Since our February Challenge was such a great success let's see what "twist" we can put on for March. Keeping in line with improving our writing skills as well as our social skills we can now include empathy with kindness. Every day instead of asking "how was school today?" please ask your child "who did you help today?" Students can write a short note telling who they helped and share it with their teacher or me! Their responses could sound like "I picked up a pencil for my friend", or "I held the door for my teacher" or "I wrote them a nice note."

Let's promote how we can proactively be helpful at school, at home and in our community.

4th and 5th Grade students are taking the first of the State B.E.S.T assessments in the beginning of April, and yes it's the **Writing Assessment (which they have to type)!**

Updates from Mrs. MacCloud, Math Coach

 The Soaring Eagles are still making great strides in math! As a reminder, all of our second - fifth grade students have access to IXL, an online math platform that allows them to practice a variety of math skills and concepts. There are so many benefits to IXL, but one of my favorites is the video tutorials and explanations when students answer a question incorrectly.



Additionally, John Hopkins University just completed a study on IXL that found that students who consistently used IXL outperformed their peers who did not use IXL by over 10 points on

standardized tests. I cannot emphasize enough how valuable this online math platform is for practicing math skills and concepts!

Grade Level Updates

PreK

Another month has flown by so quickly!! We will "Welcome" March like a roaring Lion! Some of us in Pre-k are learning about Recycling and what can be recycled with our Frogstreet Pre-k Curriculum and others are learning about Rhymes.

We are still getting a lot of late students!! Please try to get here before 8:00 a.m. We have had a lot of busing issues getting here late in the morning and getting picked up late in the afternoon. We

have a bus driver shortage, so please have patience. We do let parents know when buses are late in the afternoon.

Kindergarten

Stories have a message. That has been our focus in literacy. We've read about characters that are small, just like us, that accomplish great things, by exhibiting perseverance and bravery. Math has challenged us as we continue to show all we know about numbers 11-20 and build our addition and subtraction fluency with sums and differences to 20.

"Good, better, best! Never let it rest until your good is better and your better is best." An encouraging poem with a powerful message as we prepare each day for First grade!







First Grade

Dr. Suess Literacy Week

Who doesn't love a fable? First grade has been learning about different fables and how we can learn from mistakes...morals. e morning and picking up late in the afternoon. We are also continuing opinion writing. In math we are wrapping up our unit with adding 2 and 1 digit numbers to 100.

Second Grade

2nd grade is ready to add and subtract numbers within 1,000 in our upcoming unit in math! Please continue working with your child on adding and subtracting fluency. In reading, we are finishing up our unit involving folktales. We have been focusing on themes and summarizing main story elements.

Third Grade

3rd graders are working hard on fractions in Math! Unit 12 the students will keep learning more about fractions and also continue to practice their skills. Reading will continue with Unit 7 and the students will be learning about Communities now and in the past. The essential question is- What is a Community? Science is all about energy. Please have your 3rd grader do i-ready reading every night for 20 minutes.

Fourth Grade

Fourth grade is gearing up, working hard and getting ready for our FAST Writing in the upcoming months. Students are practicing writing an argumentative or expository essay for their test. As for Math, students will begin their decimal unit or geometry units. Geometry has a lot of vocabulary words that need to be memorized. Please have your child read nightly.

Fifth Grade

In Science, we had a fun Electric circuit review on Valentine's Day making cards using copper tape, lightbulbs and batteries. We are currently learning about our solar system. The students are working on recognizing what makes up a galaxy, the characteristics of inner/outer planets and our moon. In reading, students are deepening reading comprehension skills through a variety of texts that teaches them survival strategies used in different situations. In Math the students are wrapping up the unit on Geometry and will begin learning about measurement and data.

We encourage our fifth grade families and Meadow Park community to support our 5th graders and their end of the year activities by participating in our Domino's Pizza Card fundraiser.

Battle of the Books

Congratulations to team "Lightning Readers" who won our school Battle of the Books by answering 100 questions correctly in 20 minutes based on the 15 books they had read as a team. Music

Our <u>Kindergarten</u> classes have been learning The Florida Alphabet song (ask your child to sing it with the words that were sent home). They also just started to learn the layout of piano keyboards, as well as how to play the melody of Mary Had a Little Lamb on the keyboards.

After learning about piano fingering and hand placement, **First Grade** has been learning to play both the left and right hand parts of *Mary Had a Little Lamb* on the keyboards.

<u>Second Grade</u> just finished a unit on opera, culminating in a visit from Palm Beach Opera's Director of Education and Community Engagement, Catherine Hughes, on February 6th (see photos below). Catherine read the story of *Hansel and Gretel*, as told in the opera of the same name by composer Engelbert Humperdinck. The kids got to sing along, create their own paper gingerbread houses, and take home a Hansel and Gretel book. They are currently starting to play on the keyboards.

<u>Third Grade</u> is finishing up their "Write your own rap" projects, using *Flocabulary's* lesson on Rhythm and Rhyme. The students work in pairs or groups of 3 to come up with an original poem that they then perform for their classmates using one of the backbeats of their choosing from the keyboards.

The <u>Fourth Grade</u> classes are in the process of learning to play <u>Beethoven's Ode to Joy</u> on the keyboards. They first learn to play the melody with their right hand, then the accompaniment with their left hand. Partners can then take turns playing the right hand while their partner plays the left

and vice versa. Eventually, the goal is to play the whole song with both hands together, and a lot of students are very close to achieving that goal!



It's been so lovely watching students work to show their kindness & empathy toward each other. We've been learning that our words & actions impact others & how we treat one another matters. Looking ahead into March, our Character Now! Trait of the month is "Demonstrating Tolerance". We look forward to seeing all our Eagles demonstrate tolerance & acceptance all month long as we learn various ways to achieve this in our weekly guidance lessons.



STEM

Our Kindergarten and First Graders learned about Force and how the six Simple Machines make the amount of force needed easier with the use of them. They created catapults and learned the power of the lever! We hope they shared their designs with you at home!

Super STEM Stars Second Graders have been studying about Traits and how animals survive due to these special traits. The children created the "Who Am I?" animal game. They brought these home to share. Ask your child about the animals and their special traits! Challenge your child to describe offspring.

Thorough Third Graders studied balanced and unbalanced forces creating and designing card pyramid structures. They used the scientific method and had three trials observing how many cards and changes they needed to make for each trial. They were challenged to create a tall, square and freestyle structure. 

Student ID Replacement Procedures

Since the School District incurs costs related to providing ID badges to students, a student's first replacement ID badge within the school year will be free of charge to the student. In the event that a student needs a replacement ID badge beyond the first replacement ID badge a fee may be imposed to cover the replacement costs directly related to the replacement ID badge.

If a student requires a replacement badge in excess of five times during the school year, the Principal or Assistant Principal is authorized to follow the established processes for the determination of consequences in compliance with the Student Code of Conduct Policies – Level 1 (5.1812 and 5.1813).

Students who have lost their ID more than one time are now being charged \$5.00. The \$5.00 replacement cost for a replacement badge will include a basic lanyard.

Help Keep Our School Safe!

It is important to remind students of the multiple ways to report bullying on campus and address what to do if they are experiencing any antisemitic incidents at school. The District has several ways a student can report bullying, and it goes directly to the principal of each school:

- The Bullying Hotline 561-434-8200- they can report by calling it in, and a taped recording is sent directly to the school principal.
- Go to <u>ReportBully.PalmBeachSchools.org</u>, which opens a form and sends it directly to the principal.
- Scan a OR Code from posters found on campus to get to the same reporting form

• A reporting form is also available from the Student Portal at sign-on.

You can access a copy of the sign below through the <u>Safe Schools Resource Center</u>, which is available in English, Spanish, Portuguese, and Haitian Creole. Please post them throughout your campus.
