






READING SUPPORT

If your child has INTENSIVE READING on their schedule, it was added after Park Vista reviewed 8th grade ELA scores for all incoming 9th grade students. If a student scored Level 1 or 2 on their 8th grade ELA, they were required to be placed into an Intensive Reading class for 9th grade.

GRADES FOR NON-EOC COURSES

- Each semester is divided into 2 nine week grading periods and a semester exam
- Semester average = 1st 9 weeks (40%) + 2nd 9 weeks
 (40%) + semester exam (20%)
- 1/2 credit is earned per class per semester
- Cumulative GPA's are recalculated at the end of each semester

GRADES FOR EOC COURSES

- Algebra I, Geometry, Biology and US History are now yearlong courses that are only given a final grade and not a semester grade.
- Year average = 1st 9 weeks (15.4%) + 2nd 9 weeks
 (15.4%) + 1st semester exam (8.4%) + 3rd 9 weeks (15.4%)
 + 4th 9 weeks (15.4%) + EOC (30%)

ATTEN DANCE REQUIREMENT FOR COURSE CREDIT

- Students who are absent from a class more than 10 days in a semester must pass at least one nine-week marking period and the semester exam in order to receive credit.
- An absence in a class on block scheduling will count as two absences.
- If a student is absent more than 18 days in the entire school year in an EOC Assessment course, the student must earn a passing grade in the fourth nine-weeks or earn a Level 3, 4, or 5 on the corresponding EOC, in order to pass the course.



THE IMPORTANCE OF GRADES



FRESHMAN YEAR IS IMPORTANT!!

- Handing in classwork/homework = good grades.
- Colleges look at grades from freshman junior years as well as the rigor of the senior year, so start out strong!
- Student athletes and club members must maintain at least a
 2.0 cumulative GPA to participate.
- · Students have to repeat a required course if they fail it.
- Time management is important.
- Grade point averages are CUMULATIVE and begin with the first high school course taken even if it is in middle school.





PROMOTION REQUIREMENTS

Students are automatically promoted to the next grade level at the end of each year in high school.

WARNING!!!!!!

This DOES NOT mean that your child is on track for graduation or that they will be taking courses typical for that grade level. Remember that in high school your child needs to earn credits toward graduation regardless of what grade level they are considered.






