Tips for the first year of high school

- COMPLETE YOUR HOMEWORK THE SAME DAY IT IS ASSIGNED (I.E. ODD DAY HOMEWORK COMPLETED ON THE ODD DAY).
- Figure out where you are falling short and try something different to fix the issue
- Communicate with your teachers
 - See your teacher for additional help outside of class, try the after school Math paper service on Tuesdays and Thursdays in the Media Center, try the Paper tutoring service (located in the student's district portal; available 24/7 and in various languages)
- Pay attention in class don't hesitate to ask questions
- Ensure you have an organizational system for classes
- Improve note taking skills
- Find the right learning/study style
 - This learning/study style may vary depending on the subject area
- Be proactive with learning and do not procrastinate!
- Find a student tutor through the Honor Societies
- Prepare for exams as early as possible ensure you are organized and strategize for your exams when managing your study time.
 - With those subjects that are more challenging, make a plan to start seeing the teacher for extra help **earlier than you think.**
 - Review old quizzes, tests, ask for extra practice.
- If you have a 504 or IEP, KNOW what is listed on it. If you do not know, ask your counselor/case manager for a copy.

INDUSTRY CERTIFICATION

In line with Palm Beach County School District's mission statement, all students must **graduate college and career ready**.

At West Boca High, we offer **AP**, **AICE**, **dual enrollment and industry certification courses** in order ensure our students are prepared for college and/or a career upon graduation.

Students are encouraged to graduate with at least one industry certification. These certifications save students money in the workforce and also help build their resume.



What is an AP Class?



•An Advanced Placement (AP) class is a highly rigorous college level course, and weighted accordingly. It is on a 6.0 scale just like AICE and dual enrollment classes. (Regular classes are on a 4.0 and Honors and pre-AICE are on a 4.5 scale)

- AP courses allows students to obtain college credits while in the supportive environment of a high school classroom.
- AP classes and exams are globally uniform. An AP class in Florida is the same as an AP class in Dubai. Universities recognize this, whereas with dual enrollment classes great variation exists.

What is the AP Exam?



- Must be taken at the end of the year.
- No charge to students at West Boca High unless you do not show for the exam
- Exams designed by professors from across the US, including Yale, Princeton and Dartmouth among many others.
- Depending upon your score, it is possible to earn college credit for general education requirements at a university, or a student can advance to the next level (i.e. ENC1102 instead of ENC1101).
- Preparation for the exam is throughout the year, with the exam given in May and results coming out in July.
- AP credit granted ONLY if exam is taken (course will drop to Honors level)











The Capstone program is an elective and eligible students are nominated by their teachers and undergo an application process for admittance into the program. Students may join the program in either their sophomore or junior year.





College Board revamped its AP testing process.

The deadline to order tests was moved up.

As a result, students may not drop AP courses after October 13th or they will be subject to a \$40 obligation fee.



What is an AICE Course



- Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE)
- International Pre-University Preparation Program branching off from University of Cambridge in England
- AS levels are designed to cover introductory material
- Potential to earn college credit
- Weighted 6.0 GPA scale
- More than 450 universities in the U.S recognize Cambridge International AS and A Levels, including ALL ivy league and ivy plus universities.







- AICE tests are given at the end of a course and typically given in April/May but the dates vary.
- •They can potentially fall after school ends
- •Make-up dates are in November of the following school year
- Grades range from A-E; students need an A-E to pass the exam. U is ungraded and student did not pass exam







•Students who take AICE classes may choose to earn an AICE diploma



Accommodations for AP and AICE

Students with IEP or 504 plans have the option to take their AP and AICE exams with testing accommodations. This process is different than the process used for FSA or EOC and requires an application through College Board (AP) and/or Cambridge (AICE). If you have an IEP, 504 plan or use any school based accommodations then you are not automatically gualified to use test accommodations on AP or AICE exams. Therefore all students seeking to use accommodations on their exams must see Ms. Lombardi (IEP) or Ms. Wolfe (504) by the start of second quarter to begin the process.

The GSV award may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer an applied technology diploma, technical degree education program (associate in applied science or associate in science), or a career certificate program and not towards the completion of an associate in arts or a baccalaureate degree.

Initial Eligibility Requirements: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education.)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate with a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent.
- 3. Achieve the required weighted 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses.
- 4. Complete at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program.
- 5. Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the single Career and Technical Education program.
- Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours.

Initial Eligibility Requirements: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education.)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Earn a minimum of 5 postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit.

Florida Legislative Changes

- Florida Academic Scholars 100% of tuition and applicable fees at a Florida public postsecondary institution
- Florida Medallion Scholars **75%** of tuition and applicable fees at a Florida public postsecondary institution
- Students must earn either the required volunteer service, paid work hours, or the combination of 100 total hours
- Request your official single sitting test scores be sent to one of Florida's public colleges or state universities when registering for the ACT®, CLT®, or SAT®.
- The CLT® (Classic Learning Test) combined score is the sum of the best Verbal Reasoning, Grammar/Writing and Quantitative Reasoning from any test sitting of the CLT® for an Overall Score.
- Bright Futures awards are available for Florida Academic Scholars and Florida Medallion Scholars for the summer 2023 and summer 2024 terms.
- Beginning in the fall 2021, students enrolled in an associate degree program at a Florida public postsecondary institution will receive an award to cover 100% of tuition and applicable tees
- Applicable fees for both FAS and FMS include: activity and service fee, health fee, athletic fee, financial aid fee, capital improvement fee, campus access/transportation fee, technology fee and tuition differential fee.
- A student is eligible to apply for reinstatement for up to five years from high school graduation.

- READ THE PRINCIPAL'S UPDATE SENT TO YOUR INBOX EVERY FRIDAY/SATURDAY.
- Regularly self-assess: If what you are doing isn't producing the level of results/success that it should, then it is time to try something different.
- Ask your teacher, your counselor, or an assistant principal questions.
- Look at SIS with your parent/guardian once/week. More, if necessary.
- Communicate with your teachers in regards to your class, a grade, your accommodations. In high school, the expectation level is for the student to communicate with teachers. Have your student copy you (as a parent/guardian) on an email.
- Schedule an appointment with a teacher outside of class time to discuss an issue and obtain help.
 - If you are not succeeding on homework or assessments, look at it again, make corrections, and then see the teacher to ensure the corrections are correct.
- Avoid getting caught up in justifying and making excuses. Instead, focus your energies on being positive and proactive in confronting areas of difficulty head-on.
- Seek assistance if you need help! (teachers, counselors, APs)
